From Rev. Liz



Over the past decade we've been fortunate to bring guest speakers to St. Clement's each year. The Sisters of St. Margaret and the Brothers of Holy Cross came to us early in the first decade of 2000 and introduced us to spiritual guidance and contemplation. We've had speakers on authority in the church and supporting churches in Sudan.

We've also had major speakers from the world of religion and spirituality: Peter Gomes, Phyllis Tickle, Elisabeth Schussler-Fiorenza, Dennis Maynard, Marcus Borg, and, most recently on her third visit, Diana Butler Bass.

These individuals introduced us to private and corporate spiritual practices, and spoke to us about the current and future state of the Episcopal Church in particular, and Christianity, religion, and spirituality in general. Phyllis Tickle and Diana Butler Bass brought us new insights into what the church of the future will look like and how congregations and national religious bodies will need to adapt and even change in order to continue to thrive and be relevant in society and especially with those who are now identifying as Nones (which is what they mark on surveys when asked about "religion") and those who self-identify as Spiritual but Not Religious.

Something I find most impressive about the people of St. Clement's is how open we are to hearing different ideas and prognostications from such a variety of "experts." And then how willing we are to engage in these topics – to question, to discuss, and to form our own opinions and beliefs based on what we're hearing.

Although it isn't regularly the audience for different speakers, our between-services discussion group carries on similar conversations about challenging topics. The group reads the publications of many of our speakers and discusses them. Occasionally they invite speakers for the morning – to wit, a Buddhist priest and speakers representing different views on the conflict between Palestine and Israel. The group discusses personal spirituality, the future of the church, scripture, how our scripture and tradition affect hot issues of the day, Gnosticism, and a variety of other issues as they relate to our sacred writings and our faith. The reason for this group's existence is to accompany one another on our spiritual and faith journeys, regardless of where we are on our paths.

One of the more difficult topics currently that faces the entire parish is how we see ourselves in the next 5-7 years. Remember that the Christian tradition is in a major shift – The Great Emergence, as Phyllis Tickle calls it. St. Clement's must look to the future and evolve into a place of buildings and people that are more welcoming and willing to reach out to: (1) those whose memberships have lapsed; (2) the so-called unchurched; (3) those who live around us; and (4) the always-desired "young families with children" and "young people" (currently

the Millennial generation). And we must look again at the interior of the church and consider a more welcoming set up. We cannot make our primary criteria what's best or most comfortable for us and because we've always had it that way. Rather, what is more welcoming for those who would like to join us? I know that's difficult to accept but it is so necessary to understand that and embrace it. That's one of the major reasons we now celebrate Sunday Eucharists closer to the congregation. And, yes, that's why I've been talking about pews for the past two years. If we want to do it the way we always have (at least since 1942), then we might consider closing our doors and only letting in people who will conform to our ways.

We cannot continue to remain complacent or continue our hesitancy to speak about our faith in our daily lives. Our membership has remained relatively stable, averaging 365 over the past 5 years. One the other hand, our average Sunday attendance (ASA) has decreased by 20% over that same period of time. Our ASA dropped from 168 in 2009 to 135 in 2014. Remaining stereotypical Episcopalians who do not share their faith and invite others to church (worship and other activities) is just not going to work if we want St. Clement's to be a strong and relevant faith community in Honolulu.

The path we choose and our willingness to walk that path, then, is the direct responsibility of the vestry and the membership. The rector cannot walk that path alone. The journey into a renewed life must include 90% of the congregation and its leadership.

90% participation. It shouldn't be 20% of the people doing 80% of the ministries. That's a death knell for a faith community. God knows we don't want that.

I mentioned in my From Rev. Liz column the names of a number of well-known religious and spiritual speakers we have had over the years. Peter Gomes, Senior Minister at Harvard Memorial Chapel and author of *The Good Book*, died in 2011. More recently, Marcus Borg, well-known New Testament and Jesus scholar, died in March of this year after a long illness. In mid-May, we received word that Phyllis Tickle, author of *The Great Emergence* and many other books, has been diagnosed with inoperable Stage Four lung cancer. As sudden and disturbing this news is, Phyllis said in an article, "The dying is my new career." Her husband died this past January and she is looking forward to the remaining few months of her life with the same energy and excitement with which she has lived her life. Phyllis is planning to write a final book – a reflection on "a fruitful, grace-filled life on the meaning of death, home and soul."

Understanding these challenges, the vestry is in the process of undertaking a Parish Listening Process to determine the current and future expectations and involvement of every member in the parish. In recent memory, listening processes were done once in the late 90s and again in 2007.

Each parishioner will be asked a series of questions to help determine where the congregation feels we are today, where we want to go, and any other input the responder would like to offer. The surveys will be anonymous when collated so there should be no worries about being honest in your responses. The survey takers will only write down your responses and will not engage you in discussion. This means that the survey taker will not use phrases like, "I don't see that at all!" or "I totally agree," or "Yes, but don't you think...?" or "Did you hear ...?"

Please be willing to participate in this activity. Please be open to whomever calls you. And please make a high return possible for this important event. We can achieve a 100% response level if everyone does participate. (That was a profound statement, wasn't it?!) Without significant participation, the vestry will be making decisions arbitrarily or by guesswork. None of us wants that.

Bringing on so many highly acclaimed speakers who have kept us current on the issues facing the church has made it possible to be aware of the changes we must make as a faith community if we want to see St. Clement's into the middle of the 21st century at the very least. St. Clement's was not the same parish in the last half of the 20th century as it was in the first 50 years after its founding. I suspect Tom May and Tanner Brown and Mrs. C. Montague Cooke would be very surprised at what their little parish looks like today. It has grown and has reached a point where it would truly be missed by the surrounding community if it weren't here. We need to continue on that path and embrace the changes necessary as we move into yet another chapter of God's church in the world.





A View from the Pew

“Why do we need to go to Church?” ~ “I’m spiritual, not religious.”



If I hear one, the other, or both of the above colloquialisms again soon, especially coming out of my own mouth, I just may barf.

I understand why people ask, “Why do we need to go to Church?” and say, “I’m spiritual, not religious.” If only because I’ve asked and said the same many times. It was usually a defiant

statement to my mother as a child or to friends as an adult rather than a legitimate question or statement. And I still understand it even though the Word of God, the Prophets, Jesus, and Jesus’ Apostles in the Old and New Testaments counsel us to go to Church and make it clear that, first and foremost, we are spiritual beings.

All this being said, the Church, or the Anglican-Episcopal one at least, often counsels us that our faith rests upon a figurative three-legged stool of Scripture (the Bible), Tradition (Church traditions), and Reason (rational human thought). On the surface, it’s like the physics of a real three-legged stool, meaning that all three legs of our faith must have equal “standing” or the stool will fail and we will fall. Under this scenario, if Reason is just as important as Scripture and Tradition, “reasonable” thought insists that when Scripture and/or Tradition are illogical to our individual or collective ways of thinking, then we must turn to Reason to answer our faith-related questions. The problem, however, with this “reasoning” is that if we are to remain “reasonable,” if we are to be true to the thesis that the Three Legs of The Stool really do carry equal spiritual, theological and ecclesiastical weight, then Scripture or Tradition can legitimately trump Reason when we are not individually or collectively inclined to be “reasonable,” and Scripture or Reason can trump Tradition when we are not so inclined to be “traditional.” Personally, I envision a 3-way duel between Marshals Wyatt, Virgil and Morgan Earp at the O.K. Corral during a spat of sibling rivalry.

To be fair, renowned Anglican theologian Richard Hooker, to whom the Three Legged Stool is attributed much like the Prayer of St. Francis to St. Francis, never presupposed that Scripture, Reason and Tradition were on an equal footing. Hooker’s three legged stool seems to be an image derived from his “threefold cord not quickly broken,” in which he refers to the three strands as being Scripture, Reason, and Tradition. Even so, Hooker did not give them equal standing. Instead, much like The Trinity in the Nicene Creed, he argued our faith is jointly and severally revealed in each strand. In other words, the way we “reason” regarding faith, and the “traditions” we devise to inspire and guide us in our faith journey, should be based in Scripture not outside it. This is not to say Hooker, like the Puritans, believed there is no human role in understanding Scripture. On the contrary, he believed we have a fundamental role. On the other hand, it was certainly to say, contrary to Roman Catholic theology of the day, that everything necessary for salvation is found in Scripture. In other words, we cannot create a theology inconsistent with Scripture and expect others, let alone ourselves, to have faith in it. Put another way, the roles of Reason and

Tradition are to supplement our understanding of Scripture, not supplant it.

What does all of this have to do with going to Church or being spiritual, not religious? Everything. If we have failed to *reason* what Scripture and Tradition reveal to us about going to Church, we have likewise failed to *reason* what it means to be religious, not to mention spiritual. What do we *reason* is revealed in The Word when it shares, “*So God created humankind in God’s own image . . .*” (Genesis 1:27) or “*Now together you are the Body of Christ and individually its members.*” (1 Corinthians 12:27) or “*But they who are joined with the Lord are one Spirit.*” (1 Corinthians 6:17) or “*For where two or three are gather in my name, I am there among them.*” (Matthew 18:20)?

It’s scandalous, but the role of Church is not to serve as a place for good deeds. To be sure, it is a great place for good deeds, but it is no better than any other place. The role of Church is to inspire, guide, and lead us into doing good in our daily lives, not just on the Sabbath or on “community service” days, or because our schools require it for graduation, or our employers require it for promotions, or to advance in our civic, sororal and fraternal organizations. We go to Church to be with one another and, in the process, become the complete Image of God. We go to Church to be reminded that our neighbors and even our enemies are likewise the Images of God. We go to Church because it is only through loving God that we can truly know and finally love ourselves, our neighbors, and our enemies. We go to Church because we were commanded by our Lord and Savior to love one another as He unceasingly loves us. We go to Church to be reunited, redeemed, and resurrected, to be made one by, with, and in God yet again.
